Course Overview

Study from home during COVID-19 restrictions

Whilst we pride ourselves on our hands-on training, we have had to adjust most of our courses for study from home and remote learning during the COVID-19 restrictions. This means courses will be delivered using a range of methods including online learning, virtual classrooms, workbooks and direct contact with your teacher.

Given the government restrictions that are now in place to reduce the spread of coronavirus in Australia, we expect this new model of study will continue until the government makes changes to these restrictions.

Introduction

Take your creativity further with the Diploma of Arts.

The art industry is experiencing growth nationally, and 1 in 3 artists are bringing their creative skills to other industries, which translates to great future job prospects. But the right skills are essential.

During this course, you will develop practical, conceptual and interpretive skills as well as exploring the use of your personal imagery. You will investigate themes and refine your art into a cohesive body of work which will be exhibited at the end of year exhibition.

It is a project-based course and you will participate in a range of industry competitions, projects and exhibitions. You will develop skills in studio areas including drawing, painting, digital photography and printmaking.

Graduating students of the diploma are eligible for the Peter Lucas Award. Winners of this award receive a free exhibition at the Warrnambool Art Gallery.

This course is offered for full-time or part-time study at our Warrnambool campus. We also offer the [Diploma of Visual Arts in Colac](#) that has a textile focus.

What will I Learn?

Through working on a number of community and arts industry projects, competitions and exhibitions you will learn:

- sustainable practice

- work health and safety
- history and theory of art
- how to present and exhibit a body of work
- painting
- printmaking
- photography
- sculpture
- drawing
- developing a body of work

Upon completion of this course, you will have highly developed technical, creative and conceptual skills to plan and realize a body of work in one or more art forms. You can utilise your understanding of art theory and history to critically analyse and synthesise information from a range of sources.

Course Outcomes and Career Opportunities

With the arts industry experiencing continued growth nationally and 1 in 3 artists bringing their creative skills in other industries, there are great future job prospects.

Upon completion of this course, you may work in your own practice or in a wide range of contexts across the arts, government, community or commercial organisations.

Career opportunities may include:

- studio artist
- community artist
- public artist
- assistant curator
- gallery assistant
- arts officer

This course offers a pathway to further study in courses at Bachelor level or at Deakin University, Warrambool Campus.

Course Requirements

This section gives you an overview of entry requirements, course units and electives, skills recognition, and assessment criteria.

Entrance requirements & pre-requisites

To apply you must have the technical, creative and organisational skills to conceptualise and create works in selected mediums. Those skills and

knowledge may have been acquired through experience in creative practice or through formal study.

You will be required to provide a portfolio of art work and complete an interview with a member of the arts team. During this interview, you will be asked questions about concepts in your work, artists who inspire you, expectations of the course and your future career goals in Visual Arts.

Course requirements

To be eligible to be awarded this qualification you must successfully complete 15 units: 6 core and 9 electives.

Students will need to provide

- USB storage device
- Art materials for each studio, list to be supplied/outlined per studio.
- General kit: pens, pencils, ruler, eraser, sharpener, workable fixative, masking tape, fine liners
- Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

Students attending the course in Colac may occasionally be required to travel to the Warrambool campus for artist talks, exhibitions and to use equipment that's not available in Colac.

Assessment

This course involves accredited units. You will be required to complete assessment tasks to demonstrate your underpinning knowledge, skills and attributes to meet the course outcomes. A combination of written, oral and practical assessment strategies will be used in either a classroom, online or workplace environment.

Where units require demonstration of skills in a workplace environment, you will have the opportunity to do this either in your own workplace (where appropriate), through a practical placement, or by using one of the Institute's simulated workshops/classrooms. Detailed information about the types, conduct and dates of assessments will be provided in advance. You will also be provided with information about the opportunity for reassessment and appeal.

After applying

Once you have applied for your chosen course, you will receive a thank you email from South West TAFE with a few steps to help process your enrolment.

Complete a Pre-Training Review

You will receive an email to complete a Pre-Training Review online evaluation. This evaluation helps us tailor your training to suits your needs.

Skills recognition

If you have experience or prior qualifications, you may be eligible to apply for [recognition of prior learning](#) and gain credits. You will be asked to provide any relevant Statement of Attainment to support identified credits.

Fees

This section gives you an overview of course fees, subsidies, and how they can be paid.

Course Fees

Here's an outline of fees and costs associated with your course.

Your fees each year can be made up of 3 different elements. Everyone has different circumstances that can affect what you pay and how much you pay. :

1. Tuition fees - charged as an hourly rate that varies from course to course. A large portion of the tuition is subsidised by the Victorian Government for eligible students.
2. Resource and/or materials costs - covers the cost of materials and other incidentals. This fee will vary according to the course being undertaken.
3. Booklist items - such as textbooks, equipment and stationery recommended for your course

Tuition fees

There are 4 different rates of tuition fees. Only one will apply to you (depending on your eligibility and circumstances).

1. Government Subsidised Fee - you could be eligible for a government-subsidised rate under the Skills First funding depending on your age, educational history, and citizenship or residency status. If you are eligible, the government will contribute to the cost of your training. [Check your eligibility](#)
2. Government Subsidised Concession Fee - If you are eligible for a Skills First government-subsidised place and hold a current healthcare or pension card, that you can provide at enrolment. You may be eligible for the concession rate. [Find out more about concession rates](#)
3. Free TAFE - Students who are eligible for Victorian government-subsidised training will not pay course tuition fees for the duration of their enrolment in this course, however, there may be some consumable/material fees for the course (find out more below). Any resource or material costs, or booklist items for this course are listed in the table below.
4. Full fee - If you are not eligible for a Skills First government-subsidised place, exemption, concession or are enrolling in a course that isn't government-subsidised, you may be required to pay the full fee rate.

The fees listed below are indicative only and may be subject to change without notice and given individual circumstances. Your actual fees will be calculated based on your individual circumstances at the time of enrolment. Funding made available to eligible individuals by State and Commonwealth Governments. Resource and/or materials costs

Some courses require specific resources or materials necessary for your study eg: tools of the trade, excursions, etc. Final costs will be determined and discussed with you prior to enrolment.

How do I pay my fees?

Once we have processed your enrolment form, you will receive an email with your invoice.

You have [three options when organising your payment](#):

2. [Payment plan](#) - can be directly debited from your bank account, debited from your Centrelink payments or via a [VET Student Loan](#) (for diploma or advanced diploma courses only)
3. [Paid by employer, school or job network agency](#) - if your fees are being paid by your employer, school or job network agency, you will need to complete an Authority to Invoice form.

Payments will need to be arranged within five(5) business days of receiving the email containing your invoice.

We also offer a range of [scholarships](#) each year which you may be eligible to apply for to assist with course fees.
